

**Burials of Revolutionary War Patriots
Clinton County, NY
Valcour Battle Chapter Sons of the American Revolution**

John Addoms: Major in the 4th Regiment of Dutchess County Militia. Served under Generals Washington, Putnam and Lee for entire war. Awarded 100 acres of land bounty rights. Moved to Cumberland Head from Rockland County 1793. Wife Mary received pension. He died June 8, 1820. Burial Addoms family plot, Cumberland Head.

Matthew Adgate, Jr.: Committee of Safety, Nassau County, New York and Norwich, Conn. Born May 13, 1737 in Norwich, Conn. Part of the committees organized to help the refugees from Nassau County to escape to Connecticut when the British took New York City. Became a Judge in Clinton County. New York deputy to 3rd and 4th Continental Congress. Died March 1, 1818 and buried in Ausable Chasm Cemetery.

Jabez Allen: Born 1740. Died September 1, 1815. Buried Ausable Chasm, Peru, New York. Served in three alarms: April and September 1778, August 1780.

John Allen: Born Nov. 29, 1752 Cambridge, New York. Died Oct. 11, 1825 Peru, New York. Private 4th Regiment of Dutchess County Militia.. Awarded land bounty rights. His wife was from Dover, Dutchess County. John married Phoebe Deuel, 11th month 22, 1772, and settled near his father in Cambridge. When the Hessians under Baum were on the way to defeat at Bennington, they passed through Cambridge, where they camped overnight. Upon the approach of the Hessian, this young couple buried many of their scant possessions and fled to Dutchess county, where her parents were then living. Here they suffered the privations and depredations which fell to the lot of all those who lived along borders of the "Neutral Ground" during the revolution. They did not return to Cambridge until peace had been declared; in 1810 they removed to Peru, New York.

Thomas Allen: Born 1753, Dutchess County, New York. Died March 30, 1811, Plattsburgh, New York. Served with the 17th regiment of Albany county militia and 3rd Regiment, New York Line under Colonel James Clinton from 1779 to 1780. Buried in Riverside Cemetery, Plattsburgh.

Zenas Allen: Born May 3, 1763 in Bridgewater, Mass. Died March 29, 1811, Plattsburgh, New York. Private, Capt. Nathan Alden's co., Maj. Cary's regt.; enlisted Aug 3, 1780; discharged Aug. 9, 1780; service 7 days on an alarm at Rhode Island. Buried Riverside cemetery.

Nathan Averill, Sr.: Born December 15, 1745 in New Preston, Litchfield county, Connecticut. Died April 11, 1820 Plattsburgh, NY. Buried Riverside cemetery. Enlisted April 1775 in the state troops of Connecticut for nine months and served at Ticonderoga in Colonel Herman's regiment. Upon his return, he enlisted for four months in the state troops of Connecticut and was sent to New York City. He was discharged and then called up again and fought in the battle of Long Island.

Ebenezer Ayers: Born April 12, 1742, Hardwick, Mass. Died May 31, 1832, Plattsburgh. Private in the Connecticut Line. Bounty land warrant. Pension awarded 1818.

William Banker: Born February 9, 1756, Rhinebeck, Dutchess county, NY. Died February 11, 1832, Peru, Clinton county. Buried Peasleeville cemetery. William Banker enlisted at Rhinebeck, New York on May 12, 1777, as a Private in the 4th Regiment of the New York Line under Col. Henry Livingston. He served for three years, being discharged on May 12, 1780. A part of the time he served under Capt. Pearce and again under Col. Dubois. He took part in the campaign against General Burgoyne and was present at the Battle of Stillwater and at the Surrender at Saratoga.

Benjamin Barber: Born October 7, 1753 Harwinton, Litchfield county, Connecticut. Died March 21, 1825 Beekmantown, NY. Buried East Beekmantown. Private in the Connecticut Brigade of General Schuyler in 1775.

Jehiel Beardsley: Born January 9, 1733 Stratford, Connecticut. Died September 25, 1851 Au Sable, New York. Military record not found.

Samuel Beman: Born July 1727, Simsbury, Hartford, Conn.. Died August 20, 1821 Plattsburgh. Buried Riverside cemetery. Dutchess County militia

6th regiment under Captain Barlow served in the Canada expedition of 1775 and again in August 1777 under Captain N. Smith.

Ichabod Bosworth: Born March 1, 1748, New London, Connecticut. Died December 8, 1818, Mooers, NY. Served as Ensign first company, third regiment from June to December 1776. Ichabod was a soldier in the Revolution for the entire seven years of the war. Family records state, "He never carried a gun but was detailed to buy horses for the army". Ichabod was a soldier of the Revolution for the entire seven years of the War,* responding at first to the Lexington Alarm. In the Rev. Rolls and Lists for Conn., p. 5, may be found the following; "Dr Colony Connecticut To Wages, Billiting Horse Hire &c. for sund; Officers & Soldiers who marched from Lebanon, to relief of ye Country &c. in the late Lexington Alarm &c. marched 22 April 1775 under Capt., James Clark.

Ichabod Bosworth, Serjt. 16 days. Wages £1.7s.4d."

The record of Ichabod's next enlistment may be found in Conn. in the Revolution, where his name is given as a "Serjeant in Capt. James Clark's Sixth Company, Third Continental Regt. Enlisted May 8, 1775, discharged Dec. 18, 1775. The officers of this company were from Lebanon. Of the Third Regt., commanded by Gen. Israel Putnam the record says: "Regiment raised on the first call for troops by the Legislature at special session of April-May 1775. It was recruited in Windham County, with one company from New London County, as indicated by the residences of the officers. Marching in May by companies to the camps forming around Boston, it was stationed during the siege in Putnam's Center Division at Cambridge until expiration of term of service, Dec. 10, 1775. In July it was adopted as Continental. A detachment of the officers and men was engaged at Bunker Hill, as stated in the note on the battle appended to the last Company; a few men also joined the Quebec expedition. In re-enlisting troops for service in 1776, this regiment was re-organized, with Benedict Arnold, then before Quebec, as Colonel." (Conn. in the Rev. pp. 53 & 56)

Ichabod Bosworth appointed by the Assembly, Ensign, in a company of a regiment to be raised in the Colony under "An Act for raising two Regiments of Troops within this Colony for the special Defence of the Same."

May 1776 (Colonial Rec. of Conn. vol. 15 p. 301)

We next find him recorded in

Ensign Ichabod Bosworth (Conn. in the Revolution, p. 398)

NOTE: Hezekiah, Ichabod's youngest brother, aged 19, was a private in this company. He died in the army of small pox the following March. So his great grandson, Cornelius Bosworth of Moores, wrote the compiler in 1924, said he had it from his grandfather, Joshua, Ichabod's son. Also said his father served without pay. "He never carried a gun but was detailed to buy Horses for the army.

NOTE: There is a tradition among the descendants of this family that Icabod was present at the signing of the Delcaration of Independence in Philadelphia in July 1776, but accounts of the circumstances that brought him there at that time differ materially. One wrote that he was chosen one of six men to accompany the Governor of New York State; this account was sent me in recent years, but one sent over thirty years ago said he was on the staff of William Williams, (one of the known signers of the Declaration), and in that capacity went with him to Philadelphia and was present at the signing. When we note from Ichabod's deeds that in June 1775 William Williams was a witness to one of them; also that he was a witness to the will of Ichabod's father-in-law, and find from the Encyclopaedia that he was an officer of the Revolution from Lebanon, Conn., we feel assured the latter version is the correct one.

After the war Ichabod continued to live at Lebanon and in the 1790 U. S. Census his family consisted besides himself then aged 42, "2 males under 16" which were sons Joshua Chappel, 15, and Ichabod Truman 10; and "4 females" which were the four daughters -- Clarissa, Zelinda, Molley and Octavia, the mother having died in 1788, two years before.

Sometime later than this Ichabod and family removed from Lebanon to Moores. Clinton Co. N.Y. Hist. says it was in 1808, but it looks as if they were preparing to leave Lebanon in 1797 when above deeds were made. It may be there was some intervening station where they abode for a few years, not going to Moores until 1808. At sometime in these years Ichabod married a second wife, but no record of the marriage has been found. That her first name was Abigail, the same as his first wife, is shown by her tombstone; this is all we know of her. However, she was probably a widow

with one child, for in the 1810 U. S. Census Ichabod was living in Moores. "1 male over 45," was himself then 62 with "1 female of 45 and upward," the second wife and "1 male under 10" which was either a son of the second wife or some grandson of Ichabod.

Julian Boulanger (Belanger): Born 1746, Quebec, Canada. Died November, 1831, Chazy. Enlisted October 1776 in Captain Oliver's company, Colonel Moses Hazen's regiment (called the Canadian regiment). Served at the battles of Quebec before the revolution, White Plains, Germantown, Long Island, Brandywine and Yorktown. Discharged 1783. Granted military bounty land.

Seth Bond: Born March 18, 1758, Dover Furnace, Dutchess County NY. Died July 20, 1845 Beekmantown. Private, Captain William Tucker's company, Col. Joseph Gerrish's regiment. Enlisted June 16, 1782, discharged Jan. 1, 1779. Service 5 months, 23 days.

Elisha Bradford, Jr.: Born October 15, 1755, Plymouth, Massachusetts. Died September 23, 1835, Plattsburgh.

Indian Raid on Meduncook Plantation.

From "The Boston News Letter" of June 1, 1758, quotes from a letter dated May 22, 1758, "They (the Indians) killed and scalped Mr. Bradford, His wife and Mr. Mills' wife and killed her children. Two of Mr Bradford's boys they carried off prisoners, wounded one of his daughters and a boy of Mills dangerously."

In a book I read while staying in Maine the story went that Joshua Bradford was grinding corn outside that morning and did not hear the warning shots. Since he had earlier that winter saved the life of the the Chief when he was drowning, Joshua did not fear the local Indians. The book went on to say that Sarah hid with one of her younger siblings, but two of her brothers were taken captive, brought into Canada. It is said that many years later the two boys returned to the family, but did not like living with them and returned to the Indian Villages that they had been raised in.

It is also said that their daughter Melathiah had hid under the bed with her brother, Elisha. when Elisha cried, she crept out and dashed toward the fort. The Indians saw her as they were leaving and started in pursuit. One gave her an ugly wound which was supposed to have severed two lower

ribs from the spine. A soldier from the fort where the other children had taken refuge, succeeded in rescuing her.

Both parents, Joshua and Hannah (Bradford) Bradford were killed by Indians 22 May 1758 in Friendship, ME.

Wife, Lucy (Rossiter) Bradford, perhaps buried near Elisha

Enlisted April 1775. Corporal, 2nd Connecticut commanded by Colonel Swift. Captured at Cedars. Served at Ticonderoga. Deserted July 14, 1781. Total service between 5 and 6 years.

Samuel Brown: Born July 22, 1761 Warwick, Mass. Died November 26, 1836, Peru. Five years continuous service from June 9, 1778 to June 10, 1783 as a private 5th Massachusetts under Col. Rufus Putnam and the 3rd Continental Artillery under Col. John Crane.

James Call: Born May 1760 Woodstock, Conn. Died March 13, 1826, Plattsburgh. Buried Baker cemetery, West Plattsburgh. Enlisted Connecticut. Served in the provisional (continental) army 18 Nov 1775 thru 29 Feb 1776. Capt. Theodore Woodbridge, General Wooster.

Richard Caulkins: Born 1762. Died September 8, 1847, Peru. Buried Caulkins cemetery, Peru. Corporal. Enlisted New London, Connecticut, Captain Amos Crocker.

Charles Collins: Buried Baker cemetery, West Plattsburgh. Born 1748, Died March 21, 1827. Private, Vermont's Olcott regiment 1777 to 1781.

Caleb Cornell: Born 1756, Dartmouth, Bristol, Mass. Died August 16, 1803, Peru, NY. Enlisted December 16, 1776. Six months service in 1st New York Regiment. 1777. One year service 3rd New York Regiment 1779. Private 4th New York Line until the end of the war. Issued bounty land warrant 6977.

Francis Culver: Born July 2, 1758 East Haddam, Connecticut. Died May 9, 1822 Beekmantown, NY. Enlisted May 1, 1778 to November 30, Captain Pamerlee Allen's company of Rangers, 6th Regiment of Militia, Served again in 1779. Stationed at Castleton (in defense of the Vermont border) 1781.

Joshua Danford: Born 1750, New Britton, New Hampshire. Died 1822 Clinton County NY. Private in Captain Witcomb's company, Massachusetts Line. Pension number 3524 awarded April 1818. Issued bounty land warrant number 3053 for 100 acres.

Henry Dominy: Born December 15, 1746 Easthampton, NY. Died January 23 1817 East Beekmantown. Sergeant, Captain Ezekiel Milford company, Col. Joshia Smith's 1st Regiment, NY Militia served at Easthampton, battle of Long Island.

Thomas Douglas: Born 1769 South Kingston, Rhode Island. Died December 17, 1853 Beekmantown, NY. Buried East Beekmantown cemetery. May have been Ensign (flag carrier) as a boy for the Rhode Island Militia, but no service record found.

Luther Drury: Born November 25 1762 Shrewsbury, Massachusetts. Died November 29, 1843. East Beekmantown cemetery. Private and sergeant Captain Hutchins Independent Company, Ebenezer Allen's Regiment, Vermont Militia.

Zacheus Dustin: Born January 1755 New Hampshire. Died May 22, 1837. Baker burying ground, West Plattsburgh. Private. Enlisted November 14,

1776 New Hampshire Line, Continental Army for 3 years. At Valley Forge, first regiment, Carr's company. Pension and bounty land grant.

John Eells: Born June 21, 1760, Middletown, Connecticut. Died July 14, 1839 Peru, NY. Buried Peru village cemetery. Private Massachusetts Line. Company of Captain Rook, Regiment of Col. Smith for two years. Pension and bounty land warrant.

Waterman Eells: Born December 27, 1757 Pembroke, Massachusetts . Died June 3, 1838. Buried Mason cemetery in Peru, NY. Private Captain Gideon Ormsbee's company, 1780, Captain Thomas Barney's company, Oct. 1780, and Captain Pardee's company, 1780, 1781 and 1782 all Col. Ira Allen's Regiment of Vermont militia.

Joseph Everest: Born August 8, 1754 Salisbury, Connecticut. Died September 13, 1825. Buried Peru village cemetery. Corporal Captain John Starks' Vermont Militia, Colonel Ira Allen's Regiment.

Edward Everett: Born December 3, 1739, Dedham, Massachusetts. Died 1817, Peru. Buried Quaker Union cemetery, Peru. He was a farmer and surveyor. Captain, Colonel Bodell's New Hampshire rangers in the 1776 expedition to Canada.

George Everett: Born October 26, 1763 Stoughton Massachusetts. Son of above. Died 1812, Peru, NY. Buried Quaker Union cemetery, Peru. Drummer in his father's company in 1776. In 1777 he was in Colonel Bartlett's 7th New Hampshire regiment.

Isaac Finch: Born 1732, Fredericksburg, Dutchess county, NY. Died November 26, 1813, Peru, New York. Buried Blockhouse cemetery. Captain 6th Regiment of Dutchess County Militia. Pension and Land Bounty rights.

David Fuller: Born January 27, 1760 Tolland, Connecticut. Died April 17, 1845 Keeseville. Buried old burying grounds Keeseville, NY. Private New York Militia. Pension approved.

Ignatius Fuller: Born 1762 Lynn, Massachusetts. Died December 15, 1856 Peru, NY. Buried old Peru cemetery. Private Captain David Moore's company, Colonel Enoch Hallett's regiment. Three months duty from August to October 1780 to reenforce Continental Army in Rhode Island.

David George: Born 1755 Newbury, Massachusetts. Died February 26, 1831, Fletcher, Vermont. Lived for many years around Plattsburgh and wife Francis buried Riverside cemetery, however, he was buried in Fairfax, Vermont.

Clement Gosselin: Born June 12, 1747 Sainte-Famille, Quebec, Canada . Died March 9, 1816 Beekmantown, NY. Buried Beekmantown cemetery. Part of Benedict Arnold's Quebec expedition New Years eve 1775. Captain in Colonel Moses Hazen's regiment 1778-1779. Pension and bounty land. He was known as George Washington's French Canadian spy.

Clement Gosselin was sitting in the 4th pew of Sainte-Anne-de-la-Pocatière Church in Canada when his pastor addressed him from the pulpit:

"Our Bishop is warning you, and other rebels like you, that you must cease your seditious and mutinous behavior at once! If you join the American effort to try to expel our British conquerors from this land, you will be excommunicated! If you are mortally wounded in combat, you will be denied the last rites of the Church. No priest will hear your confession. And you will not be buried in sacred ground! Your very soul is imperiled! And so are the souls of the innocent men whom you are attempting to recruit! Give that serious thought, Clement Gosselin!"

Despite his pastor's warning, Clement continued to recruit other French Canadians to support the American assault on Quebec, Dec. 31, 1775. He went on to serve as a spy in Canada for General George Washington. Promoted to Major, at Yorktown, Virginia, he was wounded while commanding an artillery unit less than 300 yards from the British in the final battle of the American Revolution. He was given 1,000 acres of land on the west bank of Lake Champlain in upstate New York

by a grateful Congress. But his heart was always in the land of his birth - the Isle of Orleans in Quebec.

- Gosselin participated in the American [attack on Quebec City](#) on December 31, 1775, probably serving in [James Livingston's 1st Canadian Regiment](#).
- In March 1776 Gosselin joined [Moses Hazen's 2nd Canadian Regiment](#) as a Captain.
- He took part in the [Battle of Saint-Pierre](#) on March 25, 1776, when 150 pro-American Canadians and 80 Americans defeated 150 pro-British Canadians recruited by [Daniel Liénard de Beaujeu](#).^{[2][3]}
- When the Continental Army retreated from Quebec in May 1776, Gosselin went into hiding in Canada, not reappearing until August 1777, 15 months later.
- He was taken prisoner by the British in October 1777 and released eight months later in June 1778.^[4]
- In May 1778, he rejoined Hazen's regiment with his father-in-law, Germain Dionne, and his older brother, Louis Gosselin.
- On November 28, 1778, Gosselin, following a spy mission to Quebec, sent a report on the state of the British force in Canada to Washington.
- In April 1779, he went with [Moses Hazen](#) to build a proposed invasion route from the "Coos Country" of northern New Hampshire (then part of the disputed [New Hampshire Grants](#), which eventually became the state of [Vermont](#)) into Canada.^[5] Known as the [Bayley-Hazen Military Road](#), it was never completed.
- In 1780, his regiment was sent to Albany to guard the frontier from Iroquois attack.
- In June 1781, he was in [Fishkill](#) east of the Hudson River, just below [West Point](#). There his regiment received orders to proceed to [Yorktown](#) in the south.
- On October 4, 1781, he was severely wounded in the leg during the [Siege of Yorktown](#), due to wood splinters sent flying by a cannonball.

In January 1782 Clément was stationed in [Lancaster](#), Pennsylvania to guard prisoners captured at Yorktown. In 1783 he was discharged and

given a Major's pension. He was also given a land grant of 1000 acres at [Chazy](#), near Lake Champlain in New York state.

He was with [General von Steuben](#) in [Newburg, New York](#), to receive his membership in The [Society of the Cincinnati](#).

He moved to [Saint-Hyacinthe, Lower Canada](#) in early 1791, moving to [Sainte-Marguerite-de-Blairfindie](#) around 1800 and then to [Saint-Luc](#) in 1803. From 1815 on, Gosselin was living in [Clinton County, New York](#) until his death in [Beekmantown](#).^[6]

John Hayford: Born April 17, 1743 Torrington, Connecticut. Died September 25, 1821. Buried Champlain, NY. Private in Colonel Wolcott's regiment at Boston in Captain Solab Heart's 3rd Farmington Company.

Joshua Hillyard: Born January 7, 1757 New London, Connecticut. Died August 27, 1849 Plattsburgh, NY. Baker burying grounds. Seaman U.S. Navy.

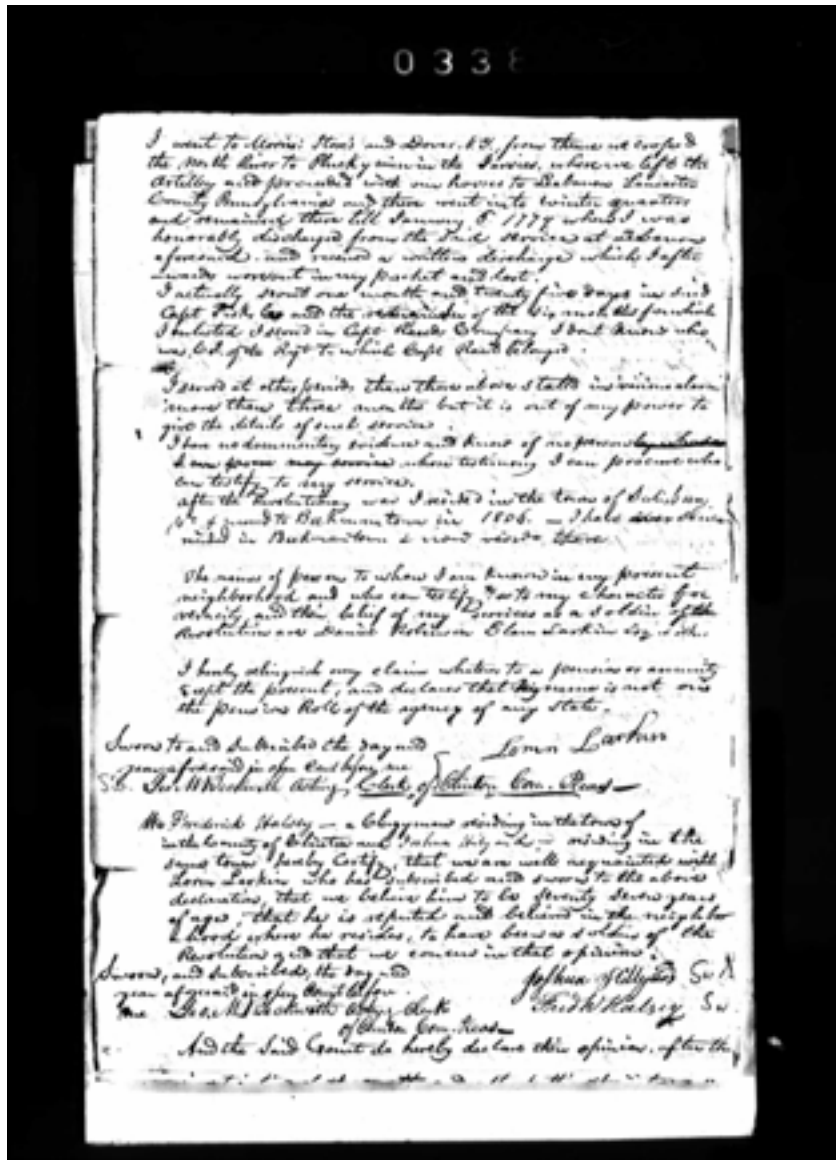
Jonathan Holmes: Born March 10, 1748 Nine Partners, Dutchess county NY. Died January 16, 1845 Plattsburgh. Old Guilliland cemetery near Salmon River. Ensign New York Militia.

Reuben Huntoon: Born 1761 Kingston, New Hampshire . Died March 30, 1844. Buried Champlain, NY. Enlisted May 1777 in Captain James Gray's company, Colonel Alexander Scammel's regiment 3rd New Hampshire. Pension files list him as a musician (fife? drum?)

Dr. Reuben Jones: Born February 24, 1747 Wilbraham, Massachusetts. Died January 7, 1833 Keeseville NY. Buried Evergreen cemetery, Keeseville. Private Captain Benjamin Hastings' company, Colonel Asa Whitcomb's regiment. Enlisted 1775 for 3 months, 12 days.

Abijah Ketchum: Born 1755. Died May 6, 1825 Peru NY. Buried Blockhouse cemetery, Peru. Private, Vanderhoof company, Albany county militia, Van Rensaeleer's 14th regiment and 17th regiment. Land bounty rights.

Loren Nehemiah Larkin: Born September 30, 1755, Stratford, Connecticut. Died October 24, 1845 Plattsburgh. Buried on Larkin property, Military Turnpike. Memorial at Riverside cemetery Plattsburgh. Pension file says he was a Private in Captain Gouch's company, Colonel Swift's regiment Vermont Militia June of 1776 through 1778. Tombstone also says at Ticonderoga with Colonel Ira Allen's Vermont militia and at Lancaster Pennsylvania. It appears that in addition to his own enlistment, he also fulfilled the enlistment of at least two other men. Below is the statement of service he gave at his pension hearing.





Jonathan Marshall: Born Mendon, Massachusetts. December 23, 1762. Died May 1, 1830 Plattsburgh. Buried East Beekmantown cemetery . Enlisted at 16 and served as Corporal Vermont rangers for the defense of the border 1781.

Burnet Miller: Born October 15, 1719 East Hampton, Long Island, NY . Died 1797 Plattsburgh. Buried Riverside cemetery. 1776 refugee from the battles of Long Island. 100 acre bounty land warrant. Member New York Assembly 1st session 1777 through 6th session 1782. The Assembly and Senate met in upstate cities through the war and were the government of the patriots of the NY colony.

Stephen Mix: Born November 2, 1748 Goshen, Connecticut. Died December 7, 1803 Beekmantown. Buried East Beekmantown cemetery. Enlisted April 16, 1777. Served until the end of the war. Private John

Butler's company. Granted 600 acres war bounty. Son (also Stephen) in the war of 1812 battle of Plattsburgh.

General Benjamin Mooers: Born 1758. Died February 20, 1838 Plattsburgh. Buried Riverside cemetery. Appointed Ensign of his uncle, Moses Hazen's regiment. Was with General Gates at Ticonderoga and later at Saratoga and Burgoyne's surrender. Later promoted to Lieutenant. Member of Washington's Life Guard under Colonel Eaton and Colonel Wigglesworth. General and Commander of Militia Battle of Plattsburgh 1814. Was also first Sheriff of Clinton County and county treasurer.

Charles McCreedy: Born 1745. Died March 28, 1813 Plattsburgh. Buried Riverside cemetery. Served in the 5th regiment of Dutchess County Militia.

James McCreedy: Born April 3 1753. Died 1818 Plattsburgh. Buried Riverside cemetery. Served in the 5th regiment of Dutchess County Militia, Fink's 13th infantry. Received land bounty rights.

Kinner Newcomb: Born August 17, 1756, Nine Partners, Dutchess county NY. Died February 6, 1840 Plattsburgh. Buried Baker cemetery. Private, captain Vanderberg's company, 2nd Regiment New York Line.

Rufus Norton: Born Connecticut. Died 1816, Port Douglas, Essex county. Buried Port Douglas. Private in the revolution. Swift's regiment, Connecticut line 1777. Bounty land warrant for 100 acres.

Hendrick Ostrander: Born October 10, 1754 Fishkill, NY. Died January 26, 1830 Plattsburgh. Hendrick was a Private in Capt. Anthony Bries' militia company (Under Kilian Van Rensselaer) in the Revolutionary War. He was appointed a second lieutenant in Capt. John Wie's company, 3rd Albany which was commanded by Henry Quakenbos.

Adoniram Parrot: Born 1758 Morristown, NJ. Died 1842 Plattsburgh, NY. Buried Riverside cemetery, Plattsburgh. Enlisted as a Private, Captain Peter Dickenson's company, 2nd New Jersey regiment. Served 1776-1783. Initially assigned to Fort Ticonderoga, in November then moved to Mount Independence in February 1777. At that time his regiment was moved south to join Washington's troops in the defense of Philadelphia. At the

battles of Brandywine, Germantown, Monmouth, Whitemarsh, Westfield, and at Valley Forge. His regiment was then sent west with Sullivan's western campaign and finally rejoined Washington at Yorktown.

Judge Charles Platt: Born March 11, 1744 Smithtown, NY. Died May 29, 1821 Plattsburgh. Buried Riverside cemetery. Served as Quartermaster, 5th regiment of Dutchess county militia. Stationed in New York City during the battle of New York and retreated with Washington northwards to White Plains and then to the Hudson Highlands.

Daniel Platt: Born April 3, 1757 Smithtown, NY. Died April 30, 1836, Plattsburgh. Buried Riverside cemetery. Enlisted June 1776 and was assigned as a steward on the sloop Montgomery under the command of Captain William Rogers. On patrol for eighteen months from Baltimore north to Boston and captured 10 vessels of the enemy and their officers and men, bringing them into Fire Island inlet. Pension and land grant.

Nathaniel Platt: Born September 30, 1741 Huntington, NY. Died May 11, 1816, Plattsburgh. Buried Riverside cemetery. Captain Suffolk county militia, first regiment of minute men. In General Woodhill's brigade, 2nd Suffolk county battalion at the battle of Long Island. Later attached to the commissary department gathering supplies for Washington's army along the Hudson.

Zephaniah Platt, Jr.: Born May 27, 1735 Huntington, NY. Died September 12, 1807 Plattsburgh. Buried Riverside cemetery. One of the founders of Plattsburgh and known as the "Patron of Plattsburgh". Captain 2nd regiment of Dutchess county militia before the revolution and Colonel during the conflict. Delegate to provincial congress 1776 and 1777. Member of the council of safety 1777 to 1778 and member of the continental congress 1784 to 1786. His father Zephaniah, Sr. was captured by the British at the battle of Long Island and died on a prison ship in New York harbor.

Antoine Paulint: Born September 1737 Grenoble, France. Died September 7, 1815 Cooperville, Clinton county. Buried Shutes cemetery, Cooperville, NY. Captain in Col Moses Hazen's regiment of foot

1775-1783.Continental Army. Promoted to brevet major by the close of the war. Pension and bounty land warrant of 300 acres.

Lucius Reynolds: Born 1750. Died March 2, 1815, Plattsburgh . Buried Baker cemetery. Col.Henry Livingston's regiment. New York militia.

John Roberts, Jr.: Born October 4, 1759, Nine Partners (Amenia) NY. Died October 3, 1842 South Plattsburgh. Buried Old Schuyler Falls (Hilliard) cemetery. Enlisted at age 15 with his father and four brothers at Manchester, Vermont in May 1775. for the Ticonderoga expedition under Seth Warner and Ethan Allen. Also served in Arnold's attack on Canada and the Battles of Hubbardton and Bennington against Burgoyne's German mercenaries.

Peter Roberts: Born 1746 Amenia, NY. Died January 24, 1804, Plattsburgh. Buried Riverside cemetery. 7th regiment of Dutchess county militia in 1768. Lieutenant in Colonel Seth Warner's Vermont regiment 1775-1776 during the attack on Ticonderoga and Canada. Later in the 8th regiment of Albany county militia. Brother of John (above).

Gideon Rugar: Born 1753 Delft, Netherlands . Died April 16,1808, Plattsburgh. Buried Riverside cemetery. Sergeant, New York Line. Pension and Land Grant. Farm on what is now Rugar St.

Avery Saunders: Born September 8,1762 Chester, New Hampshire . Died April 24, 1846 Peru, New York. Buried Allen cemetery, West Peru. Private, Captain Chase's company, 2nd New Hampshire regiment (old 3rd New Hampshire) under Colonel George Reid in the campaign of 1780.

Levi Scribner: Born 1752, Norwalk, Connecticut. Died December 21, 1818 Plattsburgh. Buried Baker cemetery. Enlisted Norwalk May 12, 1775. Served with the Connecticut continental troops as Sergeant of Rangers for two years under Captain Enoch Scribner.

Jonathan Scribner: Born September 5, 1759 Norwalk, Connecticut. Died April 7, 1841 Beekmantown. Buried East Beekmantown cemetery. Private, Captain Ozias Marvin's company, Colonel Dubois' regiment, Connecticut

militia. In the battles of Norwalk and Fairfield and deployed as part of the coastal guard.

Aaron Smith: Born May 11, 1755 Worcester, Massachusetts. Died May 21, 1824 Rouses Point. Buried Maple Hill cemetery Rouses Point, New York. Enlisted in 1775 in Colonel Webb's regiment of the Connecticut Line of the continental army for thirteen months and was discharged at Trenton, New Jersey.

Allen Smith: Born March 11, 1759 New Haven, Connecticut. Died July 30, 1847, Plattsburgh. Buried Riverside cemetery. Enlisted as a private at Waterbury, Connecticut in 1775. Was at the battles of Germantown and Stony Point under General Anthony Wayne. At Valley Forge and the battle of Monmouth. Discharged as a corporal, Westfield, New Jersey in April 1780.

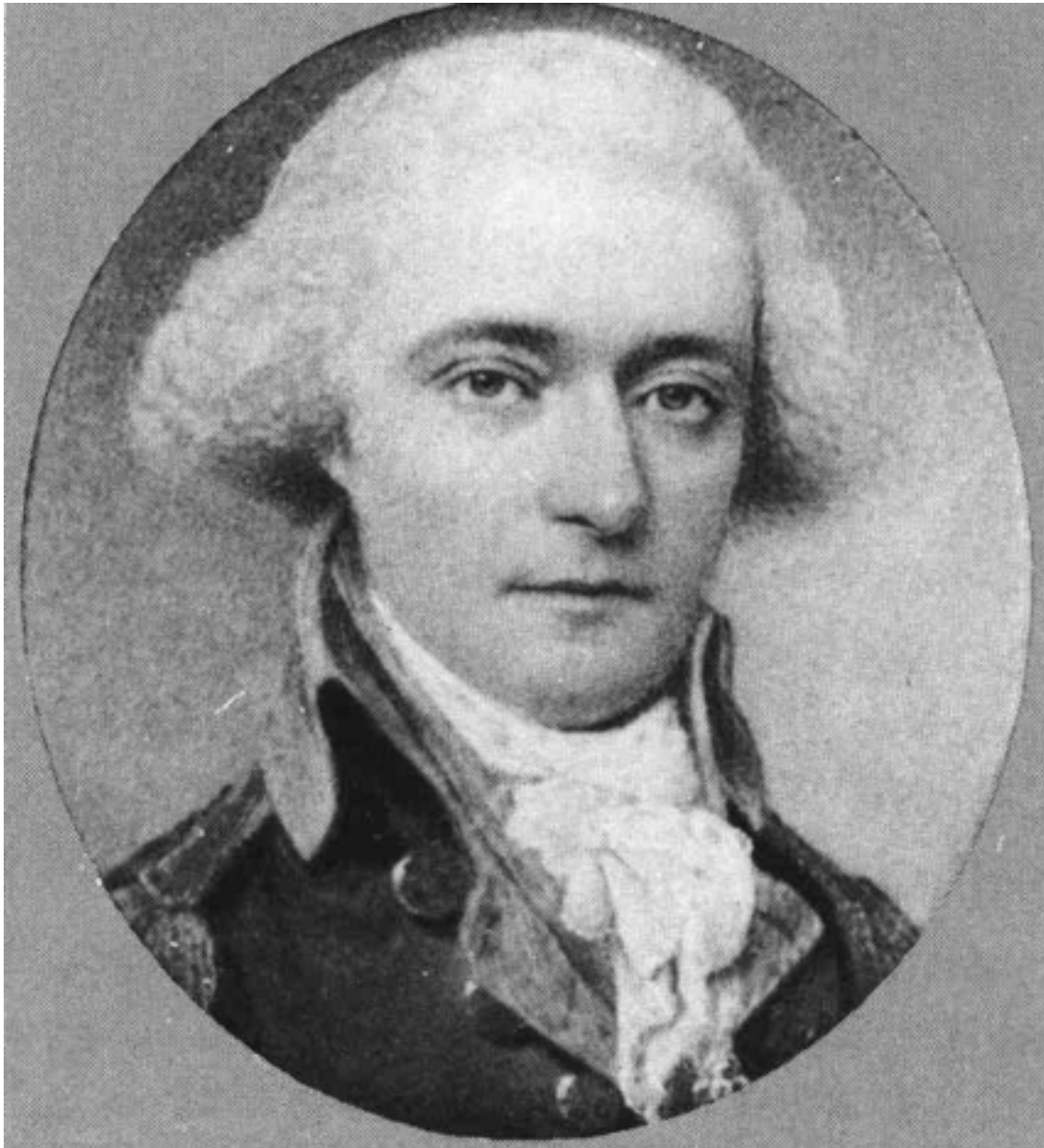
John Smith: Born 1748 . Died Beekmantown. Buried East Beekmantown cemetery. Private in the Connecticut Line, continental army.

Melancton Smith: Born 1744 Queens, NY. Died July 29, 1798 Plattsburgh. Buried Riverside cemetery. Judge. Commandment Corps raised in Dutchess county 1776 for detecting and defending against conspiracies of secret and open enemies of the revolution. Agent to purchase forage for the troops in 1778. Delegate to the first Provincial Congress. Loaned money to the state in 1780.

Garrett Thew: Born 1754 Rockland, Orange county NY . Died Plattsburgh. Buried Quaker Union cemetery, Peru, NY. Private, New York Militia, 2nd Orange county regiment under Colonel Ann Hawks Hay. Pension.

Gilbert Thew: Born 1756 Rockland, Orange county NY. Died Plattsburgh. Buried Quaker Union cemetery, Peru, NY. Brother of above. Private New York Milita, 2nd Orange county regiment under Colonel Ann Hawks Hay.

Thomas Treadwell: Born February 6, 1742 Smithtown, Suffolk county NY. Died December 25, 1832 Plattsburgh. Buried Riverside cemetery. Lawyer and judge. Graduate of Princeton and studied law under Chancellor Livingston. Thompson in his History of Long Island says: "He was one of



the most useful men of his time. He was well educated and distinguished for firmness and prudence during the difficult and trying period of the Revolution. He was almost constantly engaged in public business; was a member of the Provincial Congress from 1771 with power to establish a new form of government; He was a member of the first Senate of this state under the Constitution and seems in all respects to have been fitted for the perilous time in which he lived." He was one of three constituting the Committee of Safety while the Constitution of this state was being organized in 1773; and was for many years the only surviving member of

that memorable body. He was a representative in the Continental Congress in Philadelphia in 1772-1776; in 1775 was elected to the Provincial Congress sitting in the city of New York. In 1778 he was delegated to the New York Constitutional convention. In 1791 and 1793 he was again elected to the Continental Congress in Philadelphia. In 1804 he was elected Senator from the northern district of New York.

John M. Thompson: Born 1755. Died May 3, 1810 Plattsburgh. Buried Riverside cemetery. Private General Gold Sillamon's regiment, Colonel Samuel Whiting's company for 3 months in 1779 and 9 months in 1781. Connecticut Militia, Fairfield guards. Pension approved.

Paul Van de Voort: Born March 29, 1751 Clarkstown, Rockland county NY . Died February 27, 1831 Plattsburgh. Buried Stafford cemetery, Beekmantown. Private in Hays' 22nd Regiment U.S. Infantry, Gardner's company. Pension approved.

Joseph Westcott: Born 1744. Died June 10, 1857 Peru, NY. Buried Peaseleeville cemetery. Colonel van Reneselear's regiment of Albany county militia.

Jonathan Wickham: Born 1735. Died 1810, Peru . Buried Blockhouse cemetery, Peru, NY. He and his five brothers were members of the 2nd, 3rd, and 6th regiments of the Dutchess County Militia He was also a member of the Regiment of Associated Exempts in Dutchess County of which Zephania Platt was the Colonel. He became the first miller in Plattsburgh, settling here on or about 1785 with Charles Platt. In 1806 he sold his land in Plattsburgh and moved to Peru where he built a mill on Dry Mill Brook.

Jonathan Winchell: Born 1736, Connecticut. Died May 31, 1832, Plattsburgh. Buried Riverside cemetery. Moved from Connecticut to the Onion River, Vermont (present Winooski) before the revolution. He was driven away with all the settlement by the tories and Indians. Their houses were burned, their stock killed, and the settlement laid waste. Jonathan and his family then moved to the head of Lake Champlain and settled at White Hall where they remained until the end of the war. They then returned to

Onion river where he resided for several years until moving to Plattsburgh around 1810 to live with his son.

Bazaleel Wood: Born September 10, 1758, Lunenburg, Massachusetts. Died February 25, 1818 Plattsburgh. Buried Baker burying grounds. Private in Captain Joseph Bellow's company which marched on the alarm to Bennington under the command of Major Ebenezer Bridge.

Moses Yale: Born October 19, 1743, Wallingford, Connecticut. Died May 27, 1813, Rouses Point. Buried Maple Hill cemetery, Rouses Point. Colonel John Abbott's Vermont regiment, Captain William Sharp's company.
